




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



Mix up the cards. Lay them in rows, face down. Turn over any two cards. If the two cards match, keep them. If they don't match, turn them back over. The game is over when all the cards have been matched.</p>
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<p>Reading</p>	<p>We are learning to answer retrieval questions and develop our understanding of what we read.</p>	<p>Plastic Pollution in the Ocean Know the Facts!</p> <p>Scientific estimates that 8 million tons of seabirds have plastic in their abdomens.</p> <p>Around the world 11 million hours of plastic refuse are swept each year. That's the same as a dumpster truck of rubbish every month of every day!</p> <p>Scientific estimates it will take 100 years for a plastic can (water) to break up into the pieces in the water.</p> <p>In the UK we use 300 million single-use plastic bottles each day. About 10 million of these are 500ml, or 1.5 litre (or one litre and 500ml) bottles.</p> <p>Every day 700,000 plastic drinks containers are littered in the UK.</p> <p>Remember the 3 R's! Reduce, Reuse and Recycle. Remember the 4 R's! Reduce, Reuse, Recycle and Refuse.</p> <p>A plastic bag will take 10 to 20 years to break up in the ocean.</p> <p>Animals eat plastic bags thinking they are food.</p> <p>The TOP 10 items washed up on British beaches are:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Plastic rope and fishing nets 2. Tens packs of plastic or foam 3. Plastic food wrappers 4. Plastic bags 5. Plastic bottles 6. Fishing lines and lines 7. Caps from bottles and other containers 8. Pieces of fabric 9. Other plastic containers 10.
