# Writing in Year One.

Here are some top tips from Year 1 teachers to help you to remember everything that you have learnt at school.

#### 1. Say your sentence.

Saying your sentence out loud before writing it, helps us to know that it is not too long and that it makes sense.



Year 1 teachers say: 'point to each word as you' read it!'

#### 2. Write your sentence.

Don't forget your finger spaces in-between each word!

Sound out words to help you spell them. Use a sound mat to check your sounds.

#### 3. Check your sentence.

Does it make sense?

Have you missed any words out?

Have you remembered capital letters and full stops correctly?

Year 1 teachers say: 'read it out loud.'

### Powerful punctuation. . A ?!

The punctuation in our writing is so important. Without a full stop our sentences would be too long.

At the end of a sentence remember your full stop.

Are you asking a question? Swap the full stop for a question mark.

Are you saying something surprising or forceful? Then use an exclamation mark. Use one now!

#### Writing Checklist

Year 1 teachers say: "Have you remembered your...?"

- Capital letters
- Finger spaces
- Correct letter formation
- Full stops (or question marks and exclamation marks)

You will always have a finger space in-between a word.



You must use a capital letter to start every sentence and for names of people, places, days of the week and months of the year.

Year 1 teachers say: 'check which way round your b's and d's are!'



#### Happy Handwriting!

Ensuring that our letters are formed correctly is so important. It helps us to read back our own writing and ensures it is clear for others to read too. Forming our letters neatly and correctly (especially with the joins) strengthens both our fingers and the connection between our hands and brains.



Sometimes working out what to write is the hardest part of writing. Here are some of the ways we get our brains thinking and plan our ideas.






Circle Maps: Circle maps are used to brainstorm a topic. We put the main idea in the middle circle and record ideas and useful vocabulary that we will need around it.

Drawings: Drawing helps
us to describe what we
want to write about and to
think about it in more detail
before writing.






Drama: We often act as characters from our books.

This helps us to think about how they might feel and what they might say.
