Welcome Back!

Welcome back to the start of the new academic year to all of our families. This week we have had several new children join us so we send a particularly warm welcome to you. Starting a new school is always daunting but the children and staff have already been helping the new children to settle in; I'm sure parents will do the same as you spot new faces when dropping off and picking up. Our Home School Link Worker, Shelly Lumb, will be restarting our family coffee sessions so please look out for the dates as this is a good opportunity to meet other family members.

The first newsletter of the year is always a busy one so please do read everything as there is lots of important for you. A reminder that the layout of the newsletter includes whole school information to begin with which is relevant for everyone, and subsequent information specific to classes or year groups then comes in chronological order.

Attendance

Good attendance in school is vital. Not only for children to make academic progress but for their mental health and well-being too; children need to interact with peers their age and be sociable. There are certain illnesses which do require time off school such as chicken pox or vomiting, however, with most mild illnesses, children are able to come to school if they are well enough. Holidays in term time will not be authorised. In exceptional circumstances, a few days leave may be

granted and an Exceptional Leave of Absence form must be completed at least 5 days in advance of the date the absence is due to begin. This form can be found here:

Exceptional leave includes religious ceremonies, weddings and funerals, amongst other key events that may happen. All requests will be considered on a case by case basis and take into account children's current and previous year's attendance, and whether similar requests have been granted previously. Proof of an appointment or wedding for example, may be required.

Just to remind families that if you take your child/ren out of school without authority for 5 or more days (which do not have to be consecutive), you will be liable to receive a penalty notice. Currently the amount payable under a penalty notice is £60.00 per parent/carer per child if paid within 21 days. Thereafter the amount increases to £120.00 if paid between 21 and 28 days. If the penalty notice remains unpaid after 28 days, the Local Authority will consider a prosecution in the Magistrates Court. Please note that penalty notices are issued per parent/carer per child so a family of two parents and two children will receive 4 penalty notices.

Remember, children do tell us if they've been on holiday as they are often so excited they can't help it! So it really is best to be honest with us about the reason for an absence.

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Dates

Start of Term Transition

You may remember I shared in the summer term that for the first two weeks of term, teachers would be focussing on the relationships in the class between staff and children and the children's relationships with each other. Staff are investing time now in really getting to know the children and setting up the routines and expectations for their class. Lots of PSHE learning is taking place and some English and Maths, but the full timetable of lessons will begin on Monday 18th. You'll be able to ask questions about this at the Curriculum Information Meetings on Wednesday. You'll see updates on Facebook over the next couple of weeks about the sorts of things that have been happening.

In assemblies this week, Mrs Vale and I spoke to the children about our Whole School Behaviour Agreement. The children have had their say about the behaviour expectations of the school and this will be combined with the staff ideas gathered on the Inset day. This all links with our restorative approach to behaviour and the Stay on Green chart. The final agreement will be shared with you in next week's newsletter.

An Introduction to our Home School Link Worker

Lots of families know Shelly but if you haven't a clue who she is and what she does – please read on!

'My name is Shelly Lumb and I am the Home School Link Worker here at Saxon Primary School. I have been in role for the past 7.5 years. My background has always been working with children and families; starting as a Red, Blue and Green coat at holidays camps, moving into youth work (Shepperton Youth Centre) and progressing to running a children's home in SW London for young children with behavioural and attachment difficulties. I have my own child who is now an adult and I have been a Foster Carer, moving to Shared Lives adult care as the child, who came to us at 6 with additional needs (ADHD & ASD) and learning difficulties, is now 26.



I also worked in the early years sector for 16 years, gaining my degree and Early Years Practitioner status covering all aspects of childcare from 0-19 – but no qualification has equipped me more for my job than my life experiences. The children, young people and families I have worked with have been the most important form of learning.

My passion for working with children means I love my job. My aim is to make sure each child in our school is happy and families have positive experiences at home. To enable me to do that, I need you to work with us, to share as soon as possible when you feel something is wrong or family life is changing. We all hit obstacles in life and hopefully I can help get you over them, and if I can't, I will find someone who can.

All children have the right to feel safe and happy but it takes a team to get it right. Communication is paramount; between us, we can make that happen for your child.


